WELCOME TO SPANISH CLASS!

¡Bienvenidos! This Spanish 3 course will take you into the **Intermediate Mid** range of speaking, reading, writing, and listening (as defined by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Language). Your goal in this course is to be able to communicate in Spanish in more complex ways about a wider variety of real-world topics, while making connections and comparisons between your own culture and the diverse cultures of the Spanish-speaking world.

PRACTICE & PARTICIPATION

Learning a language requires daily practice. We will speak Spanish in the classroom approximately 90% of the time. You are expected to participate actively and speak in Spanish as much as possible as soon as you enter the classroom. Speaking in English or refusing to participate positively in class activities will hinder your progress and affect your grade.

ABSENCES, MISSED WORK & EXTRA CREDIT

Missing class takes away learning experiences and conversations that cannot be replicated. Assignments are time-sensitive and it is your responsibility to make up any missed work within a week after your absence. When handing in late work, you must send me a formal email explaining which assignments have been submitted and why the work is late.

Due to the nature of this class, **there will be no extra credit offered.** Revisions, however, are recognized as part of the language learning process. Assessments scoring below a 75% may be reattempted at the instructor's discretion, only after timely individual consultation with the instructor.

BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS

Learning a language can be a challenging and often embarrassing process. Everyone will make mistakes! In this class, you are expected to be encouraging and supportive of your classmates at all times, especially when they make mistakes. When *you* make mistakes, you are expected to handle them gracefully and learn from them.

In order to build a safe, productive, and fun language learning environment, you are also expected to **always:**

- ★ Follow **all** teacher directions
- ★ Keep your hands and feet to yourself
- ★ Raise your hand to speak during lessons
- ★ Keep electronics properly stored unless otherwise specified
- ★ Eat, drink, and use the bathroom **before** class begins (*no food is allowed*)
- ★ **Be nice, be responsible, and try your best!**

If you choose to disrupt the learning environment, you will receive a proportionate consequence for your behavior. If the behavior continues, you will be subject to further disciplinary action, including detentions, administrative involvement, and parental involvement. The order of consequences typically looks like this, but may vary due to the unprecedented nature of this school year:

1. Warning (*This may be verbal or nonverbal*)
2. Communication Home (*A formal message will be sent home and a phone call may be made*)
3. Administrative Involvement (*Documentation will be forwarded to the administration for further disciplinary action*)
